In 2017, at the SACC Convention at River Ranch, FL, Rich Mozzetta gave a Tech Session presentation on the C1 electrical system. A 31-page PowerPoint presentation with information & photos detailing the C1 electrical system that every owner needs to know so as to not inadvertently burn up their car.

I know this first hand because my 1960 had an electrical fire caused by a defective ignition switch in 1969. My insurance paid for the entire wiring harness replacement but I was required to pay for the switch, as the cause. The Chevrolet mechanic then fused my car just the way Rich has illustrated.

After his tech session, I asked Rich if he would allow me to have a copy. He not only agreed but asked for my e-mail address so he could send the PowerPoint to me. When asked directly, he had no objection to my sharing it with other C1 owners.

Fast forward to 2020. A question came up on the SACC Technical Help Section regarding this very topic. Since I am a sometime contributor in this Help Section. I contacted Rich regarding using his material in this way. His response far exceeded my expectations.

Rich has retired and closed RM Restorations, he graciously offered to donate his entire archive of restoration material to Michigan Chapter SACC for use on our website.



2021 SACC Convention Trip Report

August 25-28

Mechanicsburg, Carlisle, and Gettysburg, Pa

What a trip!

We, four of the Michigan Chapters officers, (Tom & Sue, Paul & Cheryl, Mike & Christine plus Stef & yours truly) decided to caravan to the SACC Convention near Carlisle, PA, but as a two-day trip. We did this for two reasons. First to take it easier on the cars & second because Tom & Sue had an invitation to visit the guy from Phillipsburg, PA who literally rescued them in 2014 when Tom Gamache's '54 had a front wheel bearing failure on their way to the Lancaster, PA, the site of the SACC National Convention.

The story is well documented in "Michigan" 2014 Issue 4 (reprinted on pages 15-19 the Gamache saga) as well as an article in the Winter 2014 issue of *On Solid Ground*, the club magazine.



Tom Sayers, the hero of 2014 (see page 19) and SACC member #690, who with his wife Gigi, met us in his beautifully restored Panama Yellow '58, led us to our motel, showed us his personal collection, arranged for dinner at a closed restaurant, gave us t-shirts advertising his business called "Tom's Garage", met us for breakfast then led us out of town and waved goodbye.

A young man who wandered by us in Canton at Corvettes at the Summit this year admiring our cars, made an unsolicited statement and one that caught us all by surprise. He said and I quote "People who own Corvettes are really nice".

Yes, they are!

Unless you have made the trek across the mountains of states like Pennsylvania, WV, NC, MT, WY, ID & OR, it is impossible to imagine how vast the forested & mostly uninhabited land we call home.

One of the most interesting parts of the trip for me was crossing PA from W to E, one mountain pass after another, many times just 4 – 60+ year/old Corvettes and Sue's SUV and no other traffic. We left Phillipsburg about 10:30 Tuesday morning & arrived in Mechanicsburg about 2:30 PM. Our hotel, a Fairfield Inn, was new, clean and had A/C that cooled to ~65 degrees inside w/ 90 degrees temperatures outside. The ladies spent a lot of time outside in the shade of the front entrance to warm up.



2021 SACC Convention continued



Day Zero, Wednesday, the National Board Meeting ran long from 9- 1:30 dealing with By-Law issues. Revising election process of Regional Reps to be same as National Officers, National Officers term starting time is now 1 Jan, disposition of chapter assets when one is dissolved took time. One revision is a change in interpretation rather than wording change. Previously, a SACC member was not allowed to hold a National Office and a SACC Chapter office. After an extended by-law review, the decision was that practice was by tradition rather than per by-law, so that exclusion is now eliminated.

The Chapter Board Meeting at 3:00 pm centered on the SACC by-laws, a review of 2022 & 2023 convention locations, an appeal for chapter officers present to volunteer for the open national offices and then an invitation for open discussion of other chapter issues.

Wednesday evening, we enjoyed the Reception Buffet at the hotel. By end of day, there were about 18-20 C-1s and 3-4 of the newer Vettes. Attendance was about 60 members.

Day One, Thursday, we took a 1-hour bus ride to Gettysburg National Park for what turned out to be a very memorable visit. We had been there before during the 2005 SACC Convention but this time, with the new Visitors Center Museum & its massive 360-degree interactive theater display depicting the July 1-3, 1863 battle was a couple steps above awesome. Our guide on the

bus tour, a Corvette owner with 22 years of tour guide experience, took us thru the various locations and helped us visualize the troop movement at the Battle of Gettysburg from initial surprise contact to final conclusion.

It is a real paradigm shift on how tough you think you are relative to your great-grandfather.

Thursday evening, we drove our cars to the Carlisle Country Club for the SACC Annual Membership Meeting where Lance Miller gave the keynote. Tom Gamache “won” the silent auction with 7 items. He beat me by 2. Thanks to an assist from my lovely wife, we “won” 5 items.

The membership election resulted in no change in National leadership but the VP chair is still vacant and we are still looking for Editor Ken Amrick’s replacement.



Day Two, Friday, we caravanned to Corvettes at Carlisle for the morning tech sessions which were interesting. Topic 1 was C-1 Resto-mod from modern improvements to full transformation by Tony Avedisian, whose Corvette restoration shop has been doing Top Flight restorations since before 1990.

Basically, you need a realistic idea of where you want to end up before you start. Anything is

possible, it just takes time, MONEY & motivation.

Topics 2 & 3 were packaged together with Steve Childs from Paragon Reproductions (recently purchased by Legendary Sports) and Wade Kawasaki, CEO of Legendary Sports, representing Coker Tire & Haggerty Insurance. Their topics were modern improvements to old Corvettes, and valuation of same.

Topic 4 was Corvette hardtop care & restoration.

Normally, owners don’t use their hardtop but over half of all C-1s were delivered with hardtops and at Carlisle this year, I was surprised that so many had them on. I didn’t take mine this year but I remember many shows where my car was the only one with a hardtop.

Saturday August 16

Michigan SACC members, Tom and Sue Gamache in their 1954 Corvette, and Paul and Cheryl Lemieux in their 1959 Corvette left for the 2014 SACC National Convention in Lancaster, PA on Saturday, August 16 (we missed the Woodward Dream Cruise, bummer).

The first day of driving across Ohio on I-80 was good and we spent Saturday night in Barkeyville, PA (an easy 263 miles)

Sunday August 17

We headed for Lancaster (only 258 miles) on Sunday morning. Stopped at the Pennsylvania Welcome Center and were advised to take PA322 for a scenic drive (*the first planet aligned*).

As we exited I-80 onto PA 322-E, I felt a bit of play in the **left** front wheel of the '54. Stopped along the road and confirmed all was not well. I decided to limp into Philipsburg (having traveled 107 miles since breakfast) hoping to find a place to assess the damage. Stopped at a Kwik Fill gas station (*the second planet aligned due to its visibility to the main road*). After determining that the left front wheel bearing had completely failed, I pulled out the **SACC Road Assistance Directory** and sure enough there was a Tom Sayers (SACC 690) listed in Philipsburg. Called Tom and left a message on his home phone and proceeded to contact Hagerty Ins. to arrange for a tow.

As I'm on the phone with Hagerty, the **first Road Angel** appeared in the form of John Kendrick and his friend Dewey. John said "I'm just an old hot rodder (1948 Ford Sedan with a 351 Windsor powertrain), but you're welcome to use my garage to fix

your car." After we accepted his offer, John got on his cell and called his friend who owns Corvettes to see if he would be able to help - his friend was on the way to meet us at the Kwik Fill. John told Sue and Cheryl that he called his friend, "Tom" and Sue said that we had just called someone named Tom - that's when we discovered that we both called the same person! Our **Second Road Angel** - aka Tom Sayers appears.

It was assessed, the '54 could be repaired, but we needed to get it to John's garage. After many minutes on the phone with Hagerty Ins. couldn't locate a tow service in the area. I mention this to John and John responded, "well, let me see if Jim is available". One call to Jim Washburn at Price-Parkway Service and he arrives with his tow truck (our **Third Road Angel**). I called Hagerty back and Jim and Hagerty worked out Jim's reimbursement for the tow to John's garage. (continued on page 2)


With the '54 safely in John's garage, his wife Carol (our **Forth Road Angel**) came out to sit with Sue and Cheryl and assured them that Tom Sayers knows Corvettes and he'd surely get it repaired. Off came the wheel and after an assessment of the failed bearing, Tom Sayers said "the only way you're going to get to Lancaster tonight is for me to take the drum and hub assembly off of my 1958 Corvette and install it on the 1954".

I thought that Tom probably had a 1958 parts car and we'll just take the drum and hub assembly off of the '58. How very, very wrong I was! Upon arriving at Tom's garage and opening the garage door, I was blown away. A man's dream; Corvettes, Camaros, a first generation Firebird, a 1965 Mustang, and more, all in pristine, restored condition. One example would be Tom's 1969 Z28 Camaro 4 speed with 28K miles. Tom bought it new, still owns it, and no, it's not for sale! Tom also does Corvette repair and in the back of his garage was a beautiful silver blue 1964 coupe, 365 4-speed with real Corvette knock off wheels and side pipes.

Now, I'm waiting for Tom to take us to his '58 parts car, but instead Tom wheels his floor jack over to his original/restored beautiful Panama yellow 1958 Corvette with black interior (yes, NCRS says it should be charcoal, but Tom likes black so that's what it is). Unbelievable as it was, Tom proceeds to remove the hubcap, wheel and then the original hub and brake drum assembly from this immaculate 1958 Corvette, all to repair my 1954 and allow us to proceed to the SACC National Convention in Lancaster that evening. I am in disbelief!

Words cannot describe this incredible act of kindness!

After a bit of work on the spindle to dress out the minor scaring due to the failed bearing, we were, incredibly, on our way to Lancaster. I was to ship Tom's hub and drum assembly back to him when we got back to Michigan, and he would then ship my original hub and drum assembly back to me.

But wait, the saga continues. Our initial assessment of the failed bearing was that it was just a bad bearing. An easy answer that proved to be incorrect. Pulling into the convention hotel in Lancaster, there was an all too familiar sound and feel that evening coming from the **right** front wheel. Yes, another wheel bearing failure, identical to the left front wheel bearing failure. Finally, the real reason these bearings failed - I'd installed the wheel bearing incorrectly.

Again, a look at the **SACC Road Assistance Directory**, and sure enough, Peter Botta (our **Fifth Road Angel**) was listed for Lancaster. A call to Peter and an offer to use his garage and any other assistance we needed, including transportation was made.

(Fortunately, Sue was driving our Lincoln MKX, since we needed space for our golf clubs, so we had transportation.)

Monday 18th

Peter gave me the name of a place (The Sportscar Center) that had worked on his 1953 and 1955 Corvettes. A call to owner, Mel and son Eric, at the Sportscar Center and we arranged to have the car flatbedded to their shop. A call to Paragon had a set of bearings and a seal over-nighted to our hotel.

Tuesday 19th

The new bearings arrived that afternoon and a quick trip out to the Sportscar Center got the repair rolling.

Meanwhile, we attended another great SACC convention and reacquainted with old friends, and met new friends. We participated in the driving tour of PA Dutch "Amish Country", including a covered bridge photo with the cars.

Wednesday 20th

Picked up the car on Wednesday, and enjoyed the road tour and tech sessions which took us to see a couple of

great car collections as well.

Thursday 21st

We were on our way to Corvettes at Carlisle. Parked on the Fun Field at the SACC display and was fortunate to receive a Celebrity Choice Award for the 1954. Left for Michigan after picking up the award on Sunday morning at the Carlisle Fairgrounds. Arrived home safely Sunday night and tucked the 1954 into its usual place in the garage.

Really hard to call this a "trip". It was much more of an adventure, and a very clear demonstration of just how kind and wonderful people in the car hobby are.

John and Carol Kendrick opened their home (and garage!) to strangers stranded on the road.

Tom Sayers gave me an original part off of his Corvette to use.

Peter Botta offered any assistance we needed.

While so much seems to be wrong with the world these days, this experience has renewed my faith in people and served as a high bench mark that I will try to match should I ever see someone stranded on the road or receive a call from a fellow SACC member in need of assistance!

Least you think I was exaggerating about Tom Sayers' kindness and generosity and the quality of his 1958 Corvette . Consider that the beautiful 1958 (shown below) became the donor for the drum and hub assembly necessary to get my ailing 1954 safety on the road (and continue our trip to the SACC Convention in Lancaster). Check out the rest of the story.....

Upon arriving home from the SACC Convention, I disassembled the borrowed left front hub and drum assembly and returned it to Tom Sayers, with many, many thanks. Tom immediately reassembled his Panama Yellow 1958 Corvette, and now complete and roadworthy again, Tom decided to take it for a spin to pick up a few miscellaneous parts from Corvette America in Reedsville, PA.

As Tom Sayers exited Corvette America that afternoon, there was a fellow with a camera showing a lot of interest in his Panama Yellow 1958 Corvette. He asked Tom if he might take a few pictures of the car. Tom agreed and the fellow began taking pictures. He stopped for a moment and ask Tom, "May I do a "photo shoot" of your car?"

Tom responded, "How long will the "shoot" take?" He responded, "about 2 1/2 hours." Tom said , "OK by me, I've got all afternoon." The photographer then proceeded to take hundreds of photographs of Tom's beautiful Panama Yellow 1958. 

Solid Axle Corvette Club

The Solid Axle Corvette Club is for enthusiasts who drive and show America's first sports car., our beloved C1's. The Solid Axle Corvette Club invites you to share our enthusiasm and dedication to the Solid Axle Corvettes, and to enjoy the fellowship of our members.

SACC is the initials of the Solid Axle Corvette Club. So, just what is a solid axle Corvette? The rear axle housing on all 1953 to 1962 Corvettes was a one-piece shell. The rear differential (rear gears) and the axles were mounted within this rear axle housing. (The rear axle housing is sometimes called a solid [or straight] axle housing.)

Beginning with the 1963 model year, Corvettes had an independent rear suspension (IRS). The rear differential is built into the center housing: universal joints and short shafts (called jack shafts) transfer power to the rear wheels. Each rear wheel reacts independently to the road surface, and has earned the nickname "rubber axle".

The Solid Axle Corvette Club (SACC) is a non-profit organization dedicated to the preservation, care, history, and enjoyment of the 1953 to 1962 Corvettes. Ours is a family oriented club with membership covering all members of your family. You do not need to own a Corvette to join.

Road Rules

The *Michigan* is the quarterly newsletter for the Michigan Chapter of the Solid Axle Corvette Club and is published four times yearly (Spring, Summer, Fall & Winter). It is published in PDF format, and e-mailed to members in good standing.

Membership in the Michigan Chapter is open **only** to members of the parent organization, the Solid Axle Corvette Club.
